'The Season of Light'

The beginning of a new year is a season of light. On 6th January the Feast of the Epiphany was celebrated by Christians, the manifestation of Jesus Christ to the nations, represented by the Magi (the 'Wise Men' or 'Three Kings') who bring gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh.

The journey of the Magi across the eastern sands is enchanting. Bathed in the magical light of the Star of Bethlehem, the story probably brings back memories of school nativities for many of us. The Magi present the lavish gifts of respected, educated, influential people, with symbolic importance, showing that this child is the Christ: the world's true king, God and will sacrifice himself for humanity's sake.

The rich and the poor, in spirit as well as material means, mingle in harmony in this story. And it's debatable who exactly is 'rich' here. The 'rich' don't withhold from those in need; they offer not only necessities, but luxury and beauty. In that moment, the light of Christ shines on the world and we see a hint of what God's kingdom is like.

The task of each new year is to translate the joyful spirit of Christmas and Epiphany into something that lasts year-round and follows the example of the Christ whom the Magi now adore. As the Star of Bethlehem shines upon a wondrous event, we ponder what we truly adore. What do we withhold and give? What blessings have we received from others?

One tradition associated with Epiphany is the blessing of homes. Pieces of chalk are blessed and used to inscribe a prayer over doorways, asking God to protect and prosper everyone who lives in the house throughout the coming year. The inscription looks like this:

20 + C + M + B + 23

It is composed of the year, crosses and the letters C M B. These letters stand both for the names of the Magi – Caspar, Melchior and Balthazar – and the Latin prayer *Christus mansionem benedicat* meaning 'May Christ bless this house.' Perhaps this is a tradition you'd like to take up yourself as a visual reminder of God reaching out to bless the world beyond the days of Christmas. As February turns to March, March to April, we work to make the love of Christ known in our homes and beyond.

Throughout 2023, may the light of Christ shine on you, your loved ones and all those you meet.

The 19th North Leeds Scout Group and Black Sheep Explorer Unit are thriving, with over 130 young people, nearly 25 leaders and countless more helpers and supporters. We have had a busy few months, the highlights of which we wanted to share with our wider community,

In September, we mourned the passing of one of our greatest supporters and our patron, Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth. A number of our members travelled to London to pay their respects and to join other scouts from across the country helping visitors queuing to The Queen's Lying in State; what a huge privilege.

Since then, all new members and members moving up a section have made the new promise:

> On my honour, I promise that I will do my best to do my duty to God and to The King, to help other people and to keep the Scout Law.

In terms of doing their best, we were enormously proud of the four teams who successfully completed 23 miles of the annual Six Dales Walk. (See Cover Picture) This walk, which has been running for over 60 years, is a real test of both fitness and character and also team work.

Other activities, where our young people have been able to do their best, have included camping and hostel stays, caving and climbing, archery and tomahawk throwing, cooking and camp fires. We visited a local mosque as part of our world challenge and donated gifts for the annual shoebox appeal. For UK parliament week, we debated ideas ranging from planting more trees, to recruiting more doctors and nurses, to all children getting an Xbox!

"What about badges?" you might ask. For those of you who thought scouting was all about badges, fear not! In the last 12 months, we have awarded over 1,500 badges across all the sections, including several chief scout awards – the top awards you can achieve in each section.

January was a month of culture, with a trip to the Rock'n'roll Panto (oh yes we did!) and over 120 golden tickets purchased for a family trip to see Charlie and the Chocolate Factory. We think the children nearly enjoyed it as much as the parents!

January was also a month for new beginnings, with the opening of our newest section – Squirrels – for 4 and 5 year olds. A huge thank you to everyone who has been involved in setting this up; we're sure it'll be a great success.

It may be cold and dark outside, but we have lots of adventures to look forward to as the weather improves. Highlights include hostel stays and camps, including the Challenge Camp at Bramham Park which usually sees around 4,500 members of the scouting movement from across the county come together for a weekend of just about every activity under the sun. And for two very lucky (and intrepid!) explorers, August will see them travelling to South Korea for the World Scout Jamboree. Truly, an opportunity of a lifetime.

enormously – but she will make an amazing Archdeacon! Here's what the Diocesan press office had to say about her new appointment:

Our Director of Lay Ministry, Revd Canon Dr Hayley Matthews will be the new Archdeacon of Wrexham, the Bishop of St Asaph announced today. Hayley will look after the Archdeaconry of Wrexham, which stretches north to Deeside and south to include the communities of Ruabon and Chirk, plus towns and villages east along the Welsh/English border.

Speaking of her appointment, Hayley said: "I am extremely grateful to have joined the Diocese of Leeds at an exciting time in its formation and worked alongside national projects such as Setting Gods People Free. My team and I have had many opportunities for creativity and expansion beyond those usually encountered in a diocesan role. "My role has enabled me to grow personally and I very much look forward to taking all I have learned from this experience into my new post. "Now it's time for a new challenge. Do please pray for me and my two lovely children, as we journey on with Jesus."

The Rt Revd Nick Baines, Bishop of Leeds said: "Hayley has made a huge contribution to the diocese in many areas, not least lay leadership training and lay discipleship. She goes to Wales with my thanks and my prayers."

My favourite hymn Felicity King - St Michael's

The day Thou gavest, Lord is ended by Rev John Ellerton 1826 to 1893. (No22 in Common Praise)

I became attached to this hymn when I had to fly frequently across the world for my professional work in child health with WHO and UNICEF. It was on long haul flights setting off in the evening, that verse 2 seemed particularly poignant:

"We thank Thee that Thy Church, unsleeping, while earth rolls onwards into light, Through all the world her watch is keeping, And rests not now by day or night."

Some parishioners thought that I was just taking holidays, and away from my Church Warden duties rather too often. So, to help them understand I wrote articles for St Michael's magazine about my trips and work, which I called "Wandering Warden – Postcard to the Parish". Whichever country I was visiting, I attended any available church, and there was always something vibrant, even in Afghanistan and Kuwait. The forms of service and the accommodation varied, but I was amazed at how often the 'strain of praise' (verse 3) was the same as ours. For example, "Great is thy faithfulness" is widely used, and in North Korea they sang "Jesus loves me, this I know, because the Bible tells me so". The words were translated, I was assured correctly, and the tune was very familiar.

While in the sky, I watched the flight path tracking system on the screen at my seat and could follow the earth rolling onward first into darkness and then into light. Flying from East to West, the plane sped into darkness against the earth's roll to get through the extended night and waken our colleagues (v.4), or from West to East to get ahead of the roll and overtake the dawn, (v.3), arriving where people had long been at work or worship. Either way there was a need to get on with life and our calling instead of sleeping.

The hymn was written in 1870 for missions in the days of militant imperialism, when the sun never set on the British Empire, or evidently, on Christendom. But it seems to have even deeper meaning in the days of the United Nations, jet travel, satellites, the internet, and clearer ideas about our place in the solar system.

St Chad's Recycling Update

The St Chad's Green Team is continuing to collect items for recycling in the church porch.





Thank you to everyone for taking part. As for the last few years, our stamps, batteries and spectacle donations are going well. The spectacles are taken to Oxfam or Specsavers (the latter don't

accept the spectacle cases). Donated batteries are taken to St Chad's Primary School, who have an official collection point there. Used batteries are also accepted at the city council's recycling centre or supermarkets with collection boxes, such as Sainsbury's. So, if you can recycle them yourself, please do so since they are heavy to carry, but we are happy to help if you have difficulty accessing these recycling options. We generate no revenue from batteries, spectacles or stamps, which are taken to Oxfam. As a side, Sainsbury's are also recycling used printer cartridges, which we haven't recently collected in church.

St Chad's is continuing to contribute to Terracycle through "West Park Community Recycling". The only remaining items collected in church for this include empty Teeth Cleaning Products (toothbrushes and toothpaste tubes), which generates some revenue for St Chad's School. We are no longer collecting sweet wrappers or crisp packets in church, though West Park Community Recycling (who post their collection times on the Facebook group of the same name) is still collecting both for Terracycle and the Weetwood-based Save the Planet Group is still collecting crisp packets (outside 33 Hollin Lane).

During 2022, the BBC carried out some investigations into Terracycle's business model, resulting in a Panorama programme which accused Terracycle, a company based in the USA, of misleading consumers and of shipping some of the apparently recycled items illegally to the Far East. As a result of these concerns we don't plan to return to collecting sweet wrappers or crisp packets in church for the moment and will review options for continuing with the teeth cleaning products going into the future.

St Chad's does seem to be doing very well collecting medicine blister packs! These are currently recycled through Superdrug. Blister packs can be taken directly into a collecting box in store. Those we collect in church are bagged and now taken to Superdrug in Leeds City Centre, since the Headingley branch don't collect these, due to not dispensing any medicines there. Superdrug have told us that some revenue generated by the recycling of blister packs is donated to the Marie Curie charity.

Please do let us know if you discover anything else that you think we should collect for recycling!


